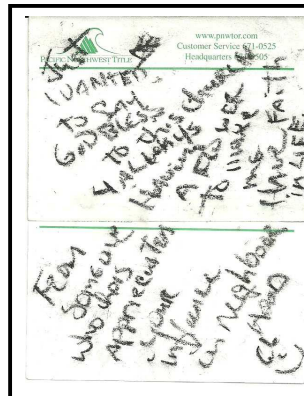

FAMILY FAITH SHARING Matthew 23:1-12

Sometimes we are like the Pharisees in today's Gospel from the book of Matthew — we do things to show off so people will think we are great. But Jesus tells us "the greater among us must be your servant. Whoever exalts himself will be humbled; but who ever humbles himself will be exalted."

Who do you think is greater in Jesus' eyes? Why? How can you serve others in your everyday life? How can you serve Jesus in his Church?

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

If we want a good example of leadership, we can look to Paul. He was gentle yet uncompromising in his desire to share the truth of the gospel. He was grateful that his efforts were not wasted. His message was received not as human words but as the word of God. God sent messengers like Malachi to pass judgment on the roles of teachers and leaders. The prophet asked, "Why do you break faith with each other, violating the covenant of our fathers?" Because they turned away from God's ways, they caused many to falter by their instruction.

Jesus was the incomparable teacher who instructed the people on how to live in peace and freedom with God and one another. Jesus told his disciples not to follow the example of hypocrites who placed the heavy burden of the law on people's shoulders and did nothing to lighten the load. Everything they did was intended to exalt their own self-importance. Jesus said that there was only one rabbi or teacher, and the rest were learners. Christians should not be haughty or proud but like children, sitting quietly at Jesus' feet, pondering the goodness of God.

FOR REFLECTION: Do I work to serve others or to serve my own interests? Does my ministry exalt myself or give glory to God.
