June 11, 2023 The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Gospel Reading: John: 6:51-58

Realize our oneness in Christ

Reflection:

Today is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. In today's Gospel reading, Jesus is telling us about the special gift he gives us in the Eucharist. Our faith teaches us that when we gather to celebrate Mass, Jesus is present to us. The bread and wine truly become the Body and Blood of Christ. This is what we mean by the word transubstantiation: Jesus makes himself present to all who receive the Body and Blood of Christ. We recognize that Christ gives us the gift of himself in the Eucharist.

Bread gives us life and nourishes our bodies. Jesus is the living bread who saves us from sin and gives us life forever with God in heaven. At Mass, when we come to the table for Holy Communion, we are participating in the very life of Jesus. We become one with Jesus, but so does everyone else at Mass who comes to the table. Our relationship with Jesus is both personal to us and also within our parish community. Together, we become people who build the Kingdom of God on Earth and look forward to eternal life with our Heavenly Father.

Discuss these questions as a family:

- * What kind of bread does Jesus say he will give? (Living bread from heaven)
- * Why is it important to attend Mass and receive Holy Communion?
- *Why do you think Jesus chose bread and wine as the ways for us to remember him?
- *What does it mean to be like Jesus?

Family Prayer:

God of love, we thank you for the gift of Jesus, the bread of life, which we receive in Holy Communion. Amen
